Glass Art Fest focuses on classes

The first Victorian Glass Art Festival is scheduled for this weekend with classes, workshops, demonstrations and a self-guided glass art tour of Victoria sites. There will also be introductory classes for beginners and hobbyists and a free, teaching-technique forum Sunday from 10 a.m. until 2 p.m. where organizer Dennis Brady anticipates "we'll do a little brainstorming."

Class costs range from \$30 for a class in kiln construction to \$400 for a two-day stained glass design class. Other classes will cover cutting, soldering, model cars and ships, mosaics, and various aspects of the glass business. Evening workshops will focus on selling wholesale, retail craft shows, wholesale gift shows and selling to the U.S. Free demonstrations all Saturday will feature installing windows, reinforcing glass panels, production and cutting guides, and packing and shipping.

"My sons and I have been visiting big glass expositions for years," said Dennis Brady, a designer and master artisan who founded DeBrady Glass in 1982, "This is the first time anyone has tried a glass art festival in Canada. One of our goals is to try to develop better teaching techniques. People are coming from all over the U.S. and Canada, and we're already making plans for next year's festival where we're going to invite more manufacturers. Next year we'll also have more crafts and focus on how to make a good living working with glass."
